Dear Study Abroad Student,

International travel affords wonderful opportunities, but also has associated risks including the acquisition of infectious diseases and the hazards of driving in a foreign country. It is strongly recommended that any UA study abroad student traveling outside of the US for work and/or study investigate the need for, and receive if indicated, travel related immunizations and medications to prevent such diseases as Hepatitis A and B, malaria, typhoid fever, yellow fever, influenza and others.

Consultation with healthcare professionals in a Travel Clinic is recommended to receive up-to-date travel advice and care. The UA Campus Health Service has an Immunization and Travel Clinic (621-2292), as does University Medical Center (626-7900) and the Pima County Health Department (294-9087). Please contact one of these clinics for a travel related consultation at least two months in advance of any planned international travel.
